
Living By Faith



Book of Proverbs – Structure




Our verse belongs to the third part of the book and is included in the last collection of proverbs.

Ten verses give the closing statement, with the accent on the importance of keeping the Torah. (Torah = books of Moses, as well as 10 commandments)

Conclusion of the 3rd Part of the Book.



After presenting three introductive verses (v. 18 – 20), mentioning the importance of the vision for the well being of the society, the collection of Proverbs talks about seven categories of individuals, with only one who retains honor: humble in spirit.

Jesus used a similar message in His sermon on the mountain. His first words were to reach those who are poor in spirit, and to give them hope and future (29: 23).

The last category (29: 27) mentions the opposition between the righteous and the wicked, inviting the reader of the book to pay attention to the message delivered by Salomon. It is obvious that there is no possible reconciliation for these groups of people. The righteous will always be an abomination for the wicked.



III. Fear, Snares, and Peace in God's Presence



<u>1. Do not be afraid of men</u> "The fear of man brings a snare"




"When David declares, "My heart shall not fear," this does not imply that he would be entirely devoid of fear, for that would have been more worthy of the name of insensibility than of virtue; but lest his heart should faint under the terrors which he had to encounter, he opposed to them the shield of faith. Some transfer the word translated in this to the following verse, meaning that he was confident that he would dwell in God's house; but I am of opinion that it belongs rather to the preceding doctrine. For then does faith bring forth its fruit in due season, when we remain firm and fearless in the midst of dangers. David, therefore, intimates, that when the trial comes, his faith will prove invincible, because it relies on the power of God."

We fear God, but we are not afraid of Him. He is our father. We have the fear of God, which means that we are afraid of hurting Him, of doing something against His will, His wisdom, and His pleasure. Why should we then be afraid of men?


