
Women in the Ministry of Jesus

Galatians 3: 26 – 28.



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"For you are all sons of God through faith in Christ Jesus... There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free, there is neither male nor female; for you are all one in Christ Jesus" Galatians 3: 26 - 28.



I. Introduction

The ministry of Jesus was to present God in the right way, to show His extraordinary love. At the same time Jesus helped men and women to become who they are: Children of God.



II. Context



The Epistle of Galatians is presenting the major challenges that Paul is facing while preaching the Gospel to those who came to the Christian faith from among the Gentiles. He presentation of the Gospel affirmed that those who are uncircumcised in Jesus they have the same status as those who were circumcised. Some other Christian leaders from the Jewish background wanted to promote another Gospel: the salvation through works of the law and the circumcision.



Our verse is part of the second challenge that Paul is facing: EQUALITY IN JESUS CHRIST. As all Christians among the Gentiles were sure to receive the Holy Spirit, Paul is launching a thoughtprovoking idea: Did you receive the Holy Spirit by the works of the law or by the hearing of faith?



In this 2nd part of the Epistle, Paul insists three times on the importance of the Spirit:

"He who supplies the Spirit to you and works miracles among you, does He do it by the works of the law, or by the hearing of faith?" (3: 5)

"That the blessing of Abraham might come upon the Gentiles in Christ Jesus, that we might receive the promise of the Spirit through faith." (3: 14)

"And because you are sons, God has sent forth the Spirit of His Son into your hearts, crying out, "Abba, Father!" (4: 6)

Gift of the Holy Spirit to the Gentiles by Faith and not by Work

Therefore,

The Holy Spirit is for Jews and Greeks, The Holy Spirit is for Slaves and Free, The Holy Spirit is for men and women.




