
Galatians 3: 6 – 8.



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I. Introduction






"Westerners often define spirituality as denying oneself, being detached from earthly concerns, and being intent on otherworldly values. 

ALL NATIONS BLESSED THROUGH ABRAHAM

"Thus, then, they who are of faith shall be blessed with faithful Abraham, and these are the children of Abraham. Now God made promise of the earth to Abraham and his seed; yet neither Abraham nor his seed, that is, those who are justified by faith, do now receive any inheritance in it; but they shall receive it at the resurrection of the just. For God is true and faithful; and on this account He said, "Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth." (Against Heresies, Book 5, chapter 32, par. 2).



II. Context



The 3rd chapter of the Book of Galatians is presenting the arguments of Paul to those who are tempted to return to the practices existing before the ministry of Jesus and to promote the salvation by the works of the law. The apostle is reminding the Christians from Galatia that they already received the gifts of the Holy Spirit through faith and the redemption in Christ through faith also. (A) and (A'). No human efforts can make a valid contribution for our salvation.

The second argument confirms that God accepts us as children of Abraham through faith only (B). In the same way, through faith, we become the sons of God (B') Through the baptism we become part of the New Covenant and receive eternal life as inheritance, promised to all true children of Abraham.



The third aspect is that the inheritance is not related to the law. If it is the case, it would be more a question of merit. But God gave inheritance to Abraham as a promise, therefore not related to his works of the law. This is how every element of the story of Abraham points toward the salvation by faith, the gifts of the Spirit by faith, and the inheritance by faith.



Structure of Galatians Chapter 3: 6 - 14



Our text about Abraham's salvation (3: 6 – 14) has a central part based on an important quotation of the OT. The text of the prophet Habakkuk is reinforcing the central concept of the reconciliation with God: "the just shall live by faith." There is no real life without faith. One can find an echo of this statement in Hebrews 11: 6. "But without faith it is impossible to please Him, for he who comes to God must believe that He is, and that He is a rewarder of those who diligently seek Him."



Verse 10 (B) is reminding all Christians that those who are trying to be saved by the works of the law must face also the cursing of those who are not keeping perfectly the law. At the same time, there is another excellent news: for those who live by faith Jesus already took the cursing on himself, in order to give us the opportunity to be beneficiaries of the blessing of Abraham.



III. Abraham as a blessing for everyone





V. Conclusion



"Every mystery which is enacted by our Lord Jesus Christ asks only for faith.

The mystery was enacted at that time for our sake and aimed at our resurrection and liberation, should we have faith in the mystery of Christ and in Christ.
