
The Book of the Prophet Jeremiah: Structure

"Knowledge of God cannot be separated from love for God. It is not merely intellectual assent that God exists. To "know" in the language of the Bible indicates intimate knowledge of the person... God shows His hesed for his covenant children by the blessings he confers upon them and, similarly, God's covenant children "know God" when then observe the covenant obligations and show their gratitude for God's blessings and return His love. 3. Three main characteristics of God's immanence "Exercising lovingkindness, judgment, and righteousness in the earth."

"God's 'hesed' endures forever. This characteristic is crucial to Israel's understanding of God's gracious relationship with them and is often repeated, becoming a refrain which resounds in the later books of the Old Testament. (e.g., Ezra 3:11; 2 Chron. 20:21). God's institution of the covenant with the people (Deut. 7:9, 12) and their king (2 Sam. 7:11–16; Ps. 89:28–29) reinforces the gracious and enduring nature of his commitment to them. God is not like a family member whose hesed can be taken for granted. He is vastly superior to the Israelites, and yet, through his covenant, he binds himself to them eternally to do them good."
