

Global Rebellion and the Patriarchs




I. Introduction

Jacob's dream was a wonderful way God used to encourage Jacob and to give him confidence and peace. This was one of the most solemn moments in his life, the beginning of a personal covenant that became reference for his entire life.



"The design of Jacob's vision was to afford comfort, encouragement, and confidence to the lonely fugitive, both in his present circumstances and as to his future prospects. His thoughts during the day must have been painful - he would be his own self-accuser that he had brought exile and privation upon himself — and above all, that though he had obtained the forgiveness of his father, he had much reason to fear lest God might have forsaken him. Solitude affords time for reflection; and it was now that God began to bring Jacob under a course of religious instruction and training. To dispel his fears and allay the inward tumult of his mind, nothing was better fitted than the vision of the gigantic ladder, which reached from himself to heaven, and on which the angels were continually ascending and descending from God Himself on their benevolent errands (Joh 1:51)." 

1. The Certitude of God's Presence "Behold, I am with you"



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



2. Our route is safe when we walk with God "And will keep you wherever you go"



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

V. Conclusion



"The Bible is not promising the absence of pain or even failure. "According to Moses Maimonides (Guide of the Perplexed), the purpose of the ladder is to explain the relationship between two realities, between existence on earth and existence in the "world of heavenly spheres," both of which are set in motion by God. Jacob sees "angels of God" on the ladder. It says "going up and down"; first they ascend and become inspired, then they descend and transmit the understanding they acquired to the world."



"In this vision the plan of redemption was presented to Jacob in such parts

as were essential to him at that time. The mystic ladder revealed in his dream was the same to which Christ referred in His conversation with Nathanael: "Ye shall see heaven open and the angels of God ascending and descending upon the Son of man." (John 1:51). The sin of Adam and Eve separated earth from heaven, so that man could not have communion with his Maker. Yet the world was not left in hopelessness. The ladder represents Jesus, the appointed medium of communication. Christ connects man in his weakness and helplessness with the source of infinite power. All this was revealed to Jacob in his dream. Although his mind at once grasped a part of the revelation, its great and mysterious truths were the study of his lifetime and unfolded to his understanding more and more." Ellen G.
