



I. Introduction: CHRIST-CENTERED LIFE






II. Context






Luke 24: 13 – 35 Structure




Jesus' methodology applicable for the proclamation of the Good News



3. Jesus is ready to take the road with us "While He talked with us on the road"




"Does Jesus speak to us today? He does. Every word of the Bible is the voice of Jesus. How do we know this? By inference. And better, by experience. First by inference. We believe that "all Scripture is inspired by God" And we know that "whatever the Father does, the Son does likewise". When the Father, by the Spirit was guiding the writing of Scripture, the will and heart of the Son was in perfect concert. Not only were all things made by the Father, with the Spirit, through the Son, but all things *are absolutely* through the Son: There is "one Lord, Jesus Christ, through whom are all things". The inspiration of the Bible was through the Son. Therefore the Bible is the word of Jesus. Second, by Experience. When we are born again, we have new ears. They are tuned to the frequency of the voice of Jesus. "The sheep follow him, for they know his voice. A stranger they will not follow, for they do not know the voice of strangers. . . My sheep hear my voice . . . and they follow me". We know the Bible is the voice of Jesus because when we hear it we hear his voice." John Piper

4. The Scriptures are Christ-centered and Christ is Bible-centered "And while He opened the Scriptures to us?'"



"Christ is the subject of Scripture. The question is not whether the Bible is Christ-centered but how? Following the pattern established by Jesus and the apostles, we find that Christ is revealed by an extensive series of types (illustrations of the reality to come) in the history of redemption. Jesus and the Apostles, however, have clued us in to an even more profound way of reading Scripture whereby Jesus does not simply appear typologically, but as a pre-incarnate actor in the drama of creation, fall, and redemption. He was the agent of creation. John 1:3 says that "All things were made through him, and without him nothing was made that was made." Dr. R. Scott Clark

"A Christ-centered life is shaped by two core convictions. The first conviction is that Jesus Christ is alive. As Christians, we do not follow a dead example but a living Lord. God raised Jesus from the dead, and he sits right now at the throne of God. But Jesus does not simply sit around. This is the second conviction: Jesus Christ is working right now on our behalf. The Bible describes Christ's ongoing work as his intercession for us:


"Jesus Christ, who died, yes, who was raised, and who is at the right hand of God, who intercedes for us" (Rom 8:34). The crucified and resurrected Jesus Christ "lives to make intercession" for us (Heb 7:25). He is actively working for us in line with God's eternal will and plan." Keith Johnson
