

Revelation 21: 4.





I. Introduction: HOPE FOR THE END OF SUFFERING








II. Context



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Our text belongs to the 6th part of the book of Revelation. In this essential part we see the end of Babylon, of the Satanic trinity, and the disappearing of evil. Obviously, God's judgment is bringing the good news of the end of suffering.

In the text of Revelation 21: 1 – 8 we can discover three parts. The first aspect of the vision confirms God's recreation (new heaven and new earth), the absence of sea (everything that was negative in the experience of God's people [cf. Ez. 26: 19 – 21; Isaiah 27: 1; 51: 9. 10; Habaquq 3:10; Flood; Revelation 13: 1], and the new city of Jerusalem. All three elements confirm that the eternity will be filled with joy, love, and peace.





The second part of the Revelation 21: 1 – 8 presents an audio message. After the vision of John, we have the hearing of a loud voice, with the explanation of the new reality. Three elements are important: Living in God's presence forever; disappearing of suffering, and the burial of the past. All events contributing to bring torment, anguish, and pain, will be eliminated.



The seven words of God end the Great Controversy. The same words that Jesus pronounced on the cross are there. It is done with evil. It is done with trouble and disorder. The conclusion confirms that from that Great Controversy will come only two groups of people: the overcomers and those who refused God's solution. For them, the only future is the second death.




III. Evil has no future. Love will overcome all enemies and will continue to reign forever. This is the good news of Jesus' victory, His death and His resurrection.

"If Paul calls death the 'last enemy' (I Cor. 15.26), then the opposite is also true: that the risen Christ, and with him the resurrection hope, must be declared to be the enemy of death and of a world that puts up with death. Faith takes up this contradiction and thus becomes itself a contradiction to the world of death. That is why faith, wherever it develops into hope, causes not rest but unrest, not patience but impatience. It does not calm the unquiet heart, but is itself this unquiet heart in man. Those who hope in Christ can no longer put up with reality as it is, but begin to suffer under it, to contradict it. 



"The Bible does not teach that the final state of glory is one of disembodied spirits. Plato and his kin wanted it that way because they thought the body was a drag on the freedom of the spirit. But the Bible teaches a very

different destiny for God's people. God will make all things new—including our bodies. Revelation 21: 4 points in this direction: "He will wipe away every tear from their eyes, and death shall be no more, neither shall there be mourning nor crying nor pain any more, for the former things have passed away." No more death. No more pain. No more tears. What that means is that the body we know now will be changed. Because it dies. And it hurts. And it cries. If death is gone and pain is gone and tears are gone, then the body as we know it here is gone."

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"This new and blessed state will be free from all trouble and sorrow; for, 1. All the effects of former trouble shall be done away. They have been often before in tears, by reason of sin, of affliction, of the calamities of the church; but now all tears shall be wiped away; no signs, no remembrance of former sorrows shall remain, any further than to make their present felicity the greater. God himself, as their tender Father, with his own kind hand, shall wipe away the tears of his children; and they would not have been without those tears when God shall come and wipe them away. 2. All the causes of future sorrow shall be for ever removed: There shall be neither death nor pain; and therefore no sorrow nor crying; these are things incident to that state in which they were before, but now all former things have passed away."
